

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and JoAnn Doleman, John and Charlotte Sullivan plus many A.V.A. friends from across the country, including Jay, Crazy Horse Trail Master who took the Romigs up early on the second day, and Susan Alton former MM now living in Texas.

The Crazy Horse walk commemorates a hero to Native Americans. The Crazy Horse Memorial walk occurs twice a year, both times as an A.V.A. event. Many walkers, including Marsha Okada, say the Crazy Horse walk is their most memorable walk ever. Carol and Dennis walked CH on the first day and again early on the second day when they accompanied the trail master doing his pre-walk check. CH walk proceeds support the local club, A.V.A., the Memorial site and local charities.

In 1876 Crazy Horse led Sioux and Cheyenne warriors to annihilate Lt. Col. George Custer and part of the U.S. 7th Cavalry at the Battle of the Little Big Horn – site of another convention walk – this one filled with ghostly memories.

Two walks, Clear Creek in Buffalo, Wyoming and the Yellowstone River in Billings, provided a close-up look at raging water rushing downstream from mountain top spring snow melt.

All walks have a bit of adventure. Be sure to ask Dennis how Carol saved him from the skunk!

Hope you are can join us on the trails! Next up on August 20 is our Capitol YRE walk. Please note the new starting point & time. As part of our walk, we will be touring the Honolulu Museum of Art on FREE SUNDAY. The Museum is really cool (airconditioned). Enjoy the beautiful artwork & get credit for walking.

We will be returning to Waikiki on September 23. If you haven't walked through the recenty remodeled International Marketplace, this is your chance. For those interested, we will be stopping at @ Teddy's Burgers for breakfast/lunch on our return route.

Two NEW traditional walks this year: The Patsy Mink Central Oahu Regional Park event is scheduled for October 28 & 29. This 259-acre park opened in 2001. It is located in Waipio/Waikele, just off the Kamehameha Highway. The Park complex includes a 20-court tennis center, Aquatic Center, multipurpose fields, and an archery range. There are walking paths that wind through the park. Tanioka's Express is also located in the park (good eats!).

On November 25, head out to the North Shore for a traditional walk at Turtle Bay. There are two 5K loops...choose one or walk both. Both offer gorgeous oceans views along the dirt/sand trails.

We're back at The Mandalay for our Christmas party. You can work up your appetite by walking the Capitol YRE with us prior the party. Brochures for the new walks & Christmas party to be mailed out in September.



Deadline for articles, photos or whatever in the next newsletter is October 15. Thanks! Menehune Marchers enjoy a long heritage in the AVA family of clubs. Today there are over 250 charted clubs in the U.S., and the sport is found in over 40 countries. It is the largest noncompetitive sports program in the U.S.

Volkssporting (literally "sport of the people") as we know it, began in 1968 in southern Germany as a personal fitness program. Events were designed so all could participate noncompetitively.

American Volkssporting began June 12-13, 1976, in Fredericksburg, Texas, as part of the celebration of the Bicentennial of American Independence.

The "father" of AVA was Rev. Mr. Kenn Knopp, a Catholic deacon from Fredericksburg. After attending a church meeting in Rome, Knopp went to Germany to visit some elderly relatives who loved to walk. Apparently Kenn was in his early 40s but overweight and out of shape. Avid walkers, his elderly aunt and uncle told him he needed to do something about his health and walking was the best thing he could do. They introduced him to their local walking club, an I.V.V. group. Knopp returned to Fredericksburg determined to improve his health and pay tribute to Fredericksburg's German heritage. (Fredericksburg was settled by German immigrants in 1846 and retains a definite German culture to this day.)

So Knopp organized the first volkssport walk. That first walk had 230-235 participants.
