#### Zoos, Aquariums, and More

In April, Dennis and I started out on our long awaited trip to South and North Carolina, and the Outer Banks (islands off of NC). After three weeks, 4 zoos, 4 aquariums, 5 gardens, 9 museums, and 14 volksmarches, we returned to Hawaii.

We started incorporating volksmarches in our trips about three years ago. By doing so, we have visited some amazing places that we would probably not have seen. All 14 volksmarches/year round events in SC and NC were top-notch.

We were in Charleston for four days. We saw many wonderful attractions in and around Charleston. We took the Charleston Garden Foundation's "Glorious Gardens" walking tour and visited 10 private gardens. Also, we visited the magnificent Middleton Place and Magnolia Plantation. The azaleas were in full bloom and absolutely gorgeous. The Magnolia Plantation is also a year round event, and part of the trail is on a boardwalk that leads to a rookery. At the rookery, we saw many snowy egrets and blue herons nesting. It was an awesome sight!

In our book, the Greenville SC year round event is one of the most gorgeous. The route takes you through Falls Park with its spectacular waterfalls, Cleveland Park, and along the Reedy River. After walking the 10K, we doubled back and visited the Greenville Zoo in Cleveland Park. We were very surprised and happy to find out that our Honolulu Zoo membership gave us free admission to the Greenville Zoo (and also the other 2 zoos and 4 aquariums that we visited); and 50% off at the Western

NC Nature Center.

One really unique year round event is the NC Zoo. The entire 10K is within the Zoo. It is a spectacular zoo and definitely worth visiting. Unfortunately, we only had a few hours at the Zoo (our rest stop en route from Asheville to Raleigh via Matthews). In Matthews, we stopped for a too brief visit with former Menehune Marcher, Sherrie Johnson.

In Raleigh, NC, we did two wonderful year round events. The first was Duke University. The second was Downtown Raleigh/Oakwood. We expected to be "wowed" by the Gothic buildings at Duke U, and we were. What was unexpected, however, was the beautiful Sarah P. Duke Gardens. This 55-acre garden is the crown jewel of Duke U and is recognized as one of the premier public gardens in the United States. The tulips, irises, and AZALEAS were incredible.

The start box for the Downtown Raleigh was is at the Museum of History. Adjacent to this Museum, is the Museum of Natural Sciences. We stopped for a few hours at both these museums, and were not disappointed. The route itself was great...took you through the heart of the revitalized downtown Raleigh, pass the Capitol and Convention Center, and many beautiful historic homes. And the biggest plus, some really good eating places.

Our next stop, Ocracoke Island. It is a little off the beaten track but definitely worth the stop. We took the scenic (and also free) ferry ride from Hatteras to Ocracoke Island. The island is small, and it took us less than an hour to drive to the opposite end. En route, however, were gorgeous stretches of beach. It seemed to stretch on forever and forever, and not a soul in sight as we walked on the sand.

We selected the one and only year round event on Ocracoke. The Ocracoke 10K took us around Ocracoke Village, the Springer Preserve, and the Captain's Landing (our hotel). On a whim, we decided to see if we could check in early (it was noon), and we could and did. After kicking back and resting for about an hour, we completed the last leg of the 10K. The Captain's Landing on Ocracoke was awesome! We had a one-bedroom, full kitchen, 1.5 baths, private balcony, satellite dish, and bicycles. The harbor was less than 10 feet from our balcony. We ended our day on Ocracoke riding our bicycles around the Village, eating ice cream, and watching the sunset. Early the next morning, we boarded the Ocracoke Island ferry for our return trip via Cedar Island. We stopped at the NC Aquariums at Pine Knoll Shores and Fort Fisher en route, and then it was onward to Charleston.

I started the 50 states special program in 2008. With these walks in SC and NC, I'm now at 10. I'm hoping to join the 50s club (States, I mean). Fellow Menehune Marchers Gordon and Ruth, Kathy and Mark, and Charlotte are also working on the States. Marsha Okada, Barbara Mateo-Kihano and B. S. McEwen have already completed a walk in all 50 states. Bravo!

#### Menehune Marchers Membership

The Menehune Marchers is one of the American Volkssport Association (AVA) clubs. This enables us to host AVA sanctioned events in Hawaii. Our walking events can be used by participants as credit toward the IVV Individual Achievement Awards. IVV stands for International Volkssportverband, also known as the International Federation of Popular Sports. As part of the AVA, we receive guidance and support from the AVA for our events and free publicity for the events on the AVA website and in the AVA newsletter, *The American Wanderer*.

The Menehune Marchers collect dues to cover expenses associated with the walking events we host. Members pay \$12 due per year. Members receive a membership card and inclusion on the club mailing list to receive newsletters, meeting announcements and flyers of our events. Club patches are available at club cost for members. The club provides a forum for members to associate with others who are interested in maintaining fitness through non-competitive walking in interesting places.

The Menehune Marchers currently has 57 members. Membership dues are \$15 for the first year and \$12 for annual renewals. We collect membership dues in July. For new members, the dues are pro-rated by the month. Checks should be made payable to the Menehune Marchers and mailed to *Menehune Marchers*, *P. O. Box 1838*, *Kailua*, *HI 96734*.
