From the President

Aloha, Menehunes,

I hope this newsletter finds you all safe, healthy and ready for your next walk adventure. Safety has always been a prime concern of mine going back to my days as a paratrooper in the Army. The risk was fairly obvious when we were conducting low altitude parachute jumps at night from a jet aircraft. However, risk of serious injury is not something one would normally expect when walking on a public sidewalk but, unfortunately, the risks appear to have increased in recent years. Below is a letter to the editor from me to the Star-Advertiser that was published on January 10:

Police need to protect walkers on sidewalks

I am the President of Hawaii's long-distance walking-forexercise club, called the Menehune Marchers, which is part of the American Volkssport Association (AVA).

Hawaii law prohibits the use of motorized vehicles on public sidewalks, and a Honolulu ordinance prohibits riding bicycles on sidewalks in Waikiki and other business districts.

In the nearly 30 years that my wife and I have walked for exercise on Oahu's sidewalks, we have observed the presence of speeding motor scooters, motorized wheel boards, motorized skateboards and Biki bicycles with increasing frequency. However, we have yet to observe a Honolulu Police Department officer issue a citation, or even a warning, for

A few of you sent me very kind comments when the letter was published which I greatly appreciated. Concerningly, although I believe the letter was necessary to try to prompt HPD interest, I have not observed any improvement. In fact, given the increasing popularity of Lithium battery powered scooters, the situation will probably worsen.

Accordingly, I highly encourage you to take extra precautions when walking in public areas. Public parks, such as Ala Moana Beach Park, that have a lot of sidewalks are of particular concern. One safety measure that Molly and I employ when walking in such areas is to walk in trail formation (one directly behind the other) while leaving at least half of the sidewalk open for the inevitable speeding traffic. One of the challenges of the electric scooters is that they are very quiet. So, the greatest risk will most likely come from behind without you hearing the scooter until it speeds by you.

Please don't let these hazards discourage you from walking. Aerobic walking for exercise is still one of the most beneficial activities that we can enjoy to help optimize our health and longevity. Please just be aware of the hazards and be extra careful. See you on the trails...
